# 10:30 a.m. Sunday, April 14: India revisited, USA re-assessing, India recalling – Malcolm Nazareth (rescheduled from November)

Terrible outcomes of climate change and the recent rise of fascism and bigotry have caused the Nazareths to vacillate between returning to India which seems to have recently embraced Brahminical Hindu Nationalism, on one hand, and, on the other, remaining in their adoptive USA which seems to have recently been bewitched by White Christian Nationalism. Not an easy discernment to make, they see it now as a life-or-death decision. For the past twenty years, Malcolm and Mariani have promoted opportunities for interfaith/intercultural dialogue and their leaving would be a big loss for our community.

Water is a potent symbol in nearly all the most ancient philosophical and religious traditions, and philosophical Taoism gives us a particularly rich teaching on water as both a metaphor and a model for effective action in and on the world. Water as a *way of being* is closely associated with the important Taoist concept of "wu wei." What can the softness, adaptability, and humility of water teach us about power and finding our way back into right relationship with each other and the non-human world?

#### President's Corner

I know that I love it when the chalice is lit at each service. There are different interpretations of the flaming chalice, including the light of reason, the warmth of community and the flame hope. We light this chalice as a symbol of our community and the spark in each of us. The chalice is a visual representation of our modern and dynamic faith. We extinguish the chalice using these words, "We extinguish this flame but not the light of truth, the warmth of community, or the fire of commitment. These we carry in our hearts until we are together again." Unitarian Universalism is about the holiness of community and the sacredness of our connections to all living things. We see this in how we are transformed when we gather in our sanctuary and online on Sunday mornings to honor our shared values and hear stories, messages and music together. We experience it when we go out in the world to witness for justice and respect. We know it to be true when we reach out to one another in times of illness and loss.

I don't know about you, but getting outside is the essential part of each day for me. Being among natural surroundings is an opportunity to connect with sources of life that are so much bigger than myself. The changing of the seasons and the arrival of Spring are powerful reminders of the forces and cycles that sustain me, in every breath I take. The wind in my face, the call of wild birds, and the warmth of the sunlight on my skin are all humbling experiences which invite me into deeper relationship with the realities of life. They are immediate and sensory forms of revelation that cannot be ignored. It is such a fulfilling opportunity for all of us as we work together and have shared experiences as we develop our commUUnity.

I would like to share this reading (580) entitled "The Task of the Religious Community"...

The central task of the religious community is to unveil the bonds that bind each to all. There is a connectedness, a relationship discovered amid the particulars of our own lives and the lives of others. Once felt, it inspires us to act for justice.

It is the church that assures us that we are not struggling for justice on our own, but as members of a larger community. The religious community is essential, for alone our vision is too narrow to see all that must be seen, and our strength too limited to do all that must be done. Together, our vision widens and our strength is renewed. —by Mark Morrison-Reed

Since we had hundreds of pounds of trees removed from our Fellowship's property last summer (Siberian Elm trees that were threatening our building), we're looking to replant 3-4 this Spring with the help of Jane Barth and Sue Weaver and others. Of course, we're focusing on native trees including those that are drought resistant, and service berry trees seem to be the most likely replacements. We'll help make preparations on April 21<sup>st</sup> during CRE, maybe even with shovels. Two tree memorials are still available at \$50/tree should you like to dedicate one of them to a loved one.

PB&J's anyone? Would the youngsters like to put on a PB&J Picnic at Bend in the River Regional Park, on the Mississippi River this summer and play bocce ball, frisbee or go on a guided tour of this unique park? A founding family of our Fellowship made this land available to the public, the Graves. If interested, when would be a good date for this? (Summers are busy but we might be able to find a good date for this.) Let me know your thoughts on this possibility. We'd also like to work on scheduling a kayak trip down the Sauk River from Cold Spring's Froggy Park to Rockville's Eagle Park. We have a couple knowledgeable kayakers who would be our guides. Please let me know of your interest and timeframes that work for your family.

And we're hoping to schedule a Sneak Preview Tour of the new Great River Children's Museum in late summer or early fall. Details in the May newsletter.

### **Supporting Our Values**

From your Budget and Finance Committee

In the midst of our annual pledge drive, we invite everyone to think about what the Fellowship means to you. What things about the Fellowship do you value, and how does the Fellowship promote and uphold your values? If you've not already made your pledge of financial support for the coming year, please do so now. Use the pledge form distributed on Sunday, March 17, or by mail after that date, or the one at the bottom of this page, and return it by April 7. We hope the following information will be helpful.

**I give regularly. Why is a pledge important?** Your pledge is an indication of what you expect to give and provides the critical information needed to accurately prepare our budget for the new fiscal year which starts in July. We need to know how much money we will have to help us accomplish our goals for next year.

What's the money used for? Income sustains our religious community. It's used to support programming for adults and children, maintain our building, fund social justice activities, and pay our fair share to the denomination at the national and regional levels.

When do I pay my pledge? The new fiscal year starts July 1. You may make payments before then or anytime during the fiscal year, which ends June 30, 2025. You can pay your pledge all at once or make payments throughout the year.

What if my financial situation changes after I make a pledge? Pledges are not legally binding. We ask that you make a pledge that is realistic based on your current and foreseeable circumstances.

Are there other ways to give? Many members and friends give of their time and talents throughout the year; these gifts are invaluable and much appreciated. Besides annual financial gifts, we welcome legacy gifts such as bequests, appreciated stock, life insurance, and other planned gifts. Contact the treasurer if you are considering this type of gift, or if you want more information about these other ways of sustaining the Fellowship into the future.
