She became famous throughout the world as the author of America's first feminist book, *Women of the Nineteenth Century*. A trailblazer in a number of fields formerly closed to women, Margaret championed not only women's rights but also the rights of other oppressed groups.

Gratitude is a powerful way to spread happiness. Gratitude practices have been found to increase psychological well-being, working memory, sleep, immune system function, relationships, and coping with emotional upheavals. "It's not the symphony of voices in sweet concert I enjoy, but the cacophony of democracy, the brouhahas and the donnybrooks, the full-throated roar of a free people busy using their right to freedom of speech. Democracy requires rather a large tolerance for confusion and a secret relish for dissent."—Molly Ivans (p. 23)

In our UU congregations, we do not expect to have sameness and perpetual harmony. Democracy is very much in line with our principles and heritage. Theodore Parker, a Unitarian ancestor, was quoted by Abraham Lincoln as saying ours is a faith "of the people, by the people and for the people." (p. 24) Parker also said that "Democracy means not I am as good as you are, but you are as good as I am." (p. 25) Equality is emphasized rather than ego. When there is difficulty, the UUs and friends can count on an accepting and open home in our Beloved Community. "People increasingly come to our congregations not merely to be fed but to feed others." (p. 29) Many are interested in supporting social justice and environmental issues. We like to be challenged. "The Hokey-Pokey is a fine metaphor for mature congregational commitment. We start testing the waters by sticking a toe in. If we can stand the temperature, we venture further in until we end up plunging into the flowing river of this responsible free religion." (p. 30)

We gain our voices when we become more than a spectator. So I look forward to hearing all of your voices.

Feedback requested on the draft from the 8th Principle Learning Community of the UUA by Judy Foster

The Article II Study Commission is excited to share a <u>full draft of Article II (PDF, 3 Pages)</u> for feedback. (*Click on the underlined link to read.*) The Study Commission's outreach team will be hosting Zoom feedback sessions in the first half of November, along with gathering feedback through a forthcoming online form for individual comments.

The Study Commission will present its final draft to the Board in January for inclusion on the agenda for General Assembly 2023. It will then be the subject of mini-Assemblies before the initial vote at GA 2023. If it passes that delegate vote by a majority, it will require a 2/3 majority vote at GA 2024 to become the new Article II of the Bylaws.

This draft makes significant changes to Article II. We invite you to read it using one of the practices we have started following in our work:

- 1. Read it the first time to observe how it makes you feel.
- 2. Read a second time, observe what it makes you think.
- 3. Finally read it a third time before thinking about any suggestions.

It will be ideal if you can hold suggestions until the online form is available so suggestions can be more easily gathered and read. But do feel free to direct questions to changemanager@uua.org
