This presentation will introduce us to the Eight White Identities and explore our role in the ongoing work of racial and social justice in our communities. 10:30 a.m. Sunday, April 17: Sing Forth the Seeds – The Wooden Shoe Ramblers

This music group will present a set of songs celebrating the earth, stewardship, and resistance to extractive industry. Featured songs will explore the costs of mining and oil extraction, resistance to pipelines, industrial disasters, climate change, and caring for the earth. The members of the Wooden Shoe Ramblers include veterans of water protector and land defense struggles, and environmental justice campaigns. Band member Emmett Doyle grew up in our Fellowship and has a degree in Environmental Studies from Saint John's University.

10:00 or 10:30 a.m. Sunday, April 24: The Nuts and Bolts of Climate Change – Kay Slama

We join the UU Church of Willmar for this Earth Day Program (joys, concerns, announcements, and discussion at 10:00; Service at 10:30). Using the En-ROADS Climate Change Solutions Simulator, Kay will show how climate change works, including the effects of actions we can take. Gain insights on how climate's driving forces—and the policies which

April President's Corner

April Brings Hybrid Services

Wow, it's officially been two years since the start of the pandemic, and we are just now being able to return for in-person Sunday services. In some ways it feels like it was just yesterday, and other times it feels like it has been 20 years since I've seen people in person. Our Board approved re-opening guidelines state that if the COVID case rate for Stearns County is under 30 per 10,000 people, we can offer hybrid services. The entire month of March has seen case rates in the 20's and just this Friday the case rate dropped to 8 per 10,000 people.

Hybrid services will allow for those that choose to reconvene in person and those that choose to continue to Zoom in to services from home. This will require us to all give each other support and allow for adaptability as we try new technology and service formats.

This newsletter article will outline for you the ReOpening Guidelines that our ReOpening Committee created and was Board approved in May 2021. The following will provide information about how hybrid services will work.

So, what is a hybrid Sunday Service? This means we can accommodate folks who would like to attend services in person, as well as having a Zoom alternative for those who would prefer to continue participating from home. Some of our presenters will attend in person and some will continue to present via Zoom. We will hold our services in hybrid form regardless of where our presenters are. This means we may have services you decide to attend in person, and the presenter will be broadcast to us over the large TVs. The Program Committee will be adding the location of the presenter to their information in the newsletter and on the website as we know this may impact your decision of how you want to attend services. As changes occur in infection rates, we do want to be mindful that a presenter may change the location in which they will present from after this information is published in the newsletter and online. Adaptability and understanding will need to drive how we support each other, our Fellowship, and our community presenters and ministers. If you choose to come to the Fellowship in person, some rules have been put in place to make sure we have a safe environment for everyone.

- 1. Masks are required for everyone (ages 2 and up) at all times when in the Fellowship building.
- 2. You will be asked to "log in" with your name and contact information in case a member who attended in-person services is diagnosed as positive for Covid. MDH contact tracing requires this information.
- 3. We encourage you to social distance by household. If needed, we may use both the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall to seat people for the service.
- 4. There will be no food or drinks available or allowed (except for medical reasons) in the Fellowship building. This means after service snacks, drinks, and Soup Sunday cannot be offered at this time. But, you are encouraged to stay after the service to visit and connect.
- 5. The collection plate will not be passed. There will be a labeled box available for the offering (or you can choose to mail it or use our PayPal pay option).
- 6. Our musicians are excited to still bring us music. Singing can occur as long as all congregants are masked. We will not be utilizing hymnals, and if needed lyrics will be displayed on the TV.
- 8. Nursery will be open, but not staffed by nursery attendants. Parents will need to stay with their children in the nursery room.
- 9. If you are sick, have had a recent exposure, or are COVID positive, we ask that you stay home and attend via Zoom.

Program Notes

Our Sunday Programs in <u>April</u> feature presentations on social justice and environmental concerns that are of vital importance to our lives and future: immigration, racial equity, environmental justice, and climate change. They were scheduled with the expectation that the presentations would take place via Zoom. As we transition to offering hybrid services as described in Lisa's article, the program committee decided to proceed as planned, with the April presenters coming to us via Zoom. YOU may participate in person or via Zoom,

as described in Lisa's article.

Looking ahead to <u>May</u>, we will have a guest seminarian and a guest minister. In addition, the Caring Committee is planning the May 22 program which will take place in a park. It will provide an opportunity for celebrating lives of members and friends who died in recent years and grieving losses in our personal lives during the pandemic. Looking ahead to <u>summer</u>, the Program Committee will coordinate a schedule of summer activities rather than arrange weekly Sunday Programs. See separate article seeking your ideas.
