It can even change our personality and identity. Unbelievable amounts of money, time, and energy are spent every year in an effort to escape pain, with varying degrees of success. Our culture, especially marketing, suggests that people are wrong to experience suffering, and they just happen to have the thing that will make that pain go away! Yet the truth is, we are all hurting. Join us as we examine pain and how it affects each of us. It should be a relatively pain-free service!

The Program Committee appreciates the additional opportunities Zoom provides for us to have a greater variety of presenters, and we hope you do too. We also like the flexibility for presenters to be with us even when the weather or other circumstances interfere with them coming to our building on Sunday morning. Even when the presenter is not in the Fellowship building, some elements of the Sunday Service take place at the building. We hope all of you find the experience meaningful whether you choose to come to the building or attend on Zoom, and whether the presenter is in person or on Zoom. We thank the Tech Team for making this multiplatform opportunity possible.

Going forward, the program committee will do our best to include information in the newsletter about what we know of each presenter's intention. If there is a change in plans, we will attempt to have that included in the weekend announcement that Judy sends by email. Even then, plans can change at the last minute, and you may find that the program is different than your expectation.

**For January**, we expect presenters will be at the building, except for January 15. Even then there will be an opportunity for in-person interaction as part of the program Willman is presenting.

#### President's Corner

Greetings to you, Beloveds. As we conclude this season of holidays and celebration, I hope you encountered joy in your time together with family and friends. I look forward to our programs and activities resuming It's exciting to have larger groups and visitors at the Fellowship as we continue to have stable numbers on Zoom.

I want to thank Julie Peters for attending the Kwanza celebration as our representative. She read a blessing and observed a crowd of a couple hundred people. Both dancing and drumming were a part of the event. World Religions Day will be observed on the afternoon of Saturday, January 21 at St. Cloud Library's Mississippi Room. At this point, we are co-sponsors with members of the Baha'i Faith. We hope other faith groups will participate. I attended the planning meeting and will continue working on the event and will announce updates during January.

On January 15th, we will have a presentation by Kay Slama from Willmar. She will present the UUA's process of reviewing and updating Article II, which includes our guiding Principles, Sources and Purposes. She'll explain about how this fits with the 8th Principle Initiative. There will be an opportunity to discuss this in breakout groups. I highly encourage you to attend.

I continue to share information from the book GROWING A BELOVED COMMUNITY by Tom Owen-Towle. The 6th hallmark of a healthy congregation is "Balance Justice and Joy." E.B. White capitalizes the balancing act like this: "I arise in the morning, torn between a desire to improve (or save) the world, and a desire to enjoy (or savor) the world. This makes it hard to plan the day. A healthy congregation is asked to save and savor its world in harmony with each other. We need to 'juggle' moments of both duty and delight. Sometimes they turn out to be one and the same—as when we celebrate justly and do justice work joyfully. Or as the Zuni people phase it, 'We dance for pleasure and the good of the city'". (p. 43)

We can consider whether we are "a saving force or a serving faith. Or some of both?" (p.43) I really connect with what Rev. Scott Alexander has said as he "exhorts our congregations to 'help save the human enterprise at every level: myself, others, our culture, and the planet." (p. 43) Love is an activity, a feeling contained in our actions. We need to strive to serve our world using our abilities and our enthusiasm that enables us to experience big or small victories.

The image of a puzzle brings the balance of justice and joy into focus. "We all have a pocketful of puzzle pieces, representing the skills and experiences we contribute to the common good. I can pocket my pieces, hoarding them, or I can play them. If I do a cost-benefit analysis of working for social justice, I might never play these pieces, because it takes a leap of faith to step up to the table of history and say 'I'm willing to commit myself to making changes.' There are no guarantees, and we can't see the cover of the box to know where to place the pieces or how the pattern will come out, To play these pieces means to play with faith, knowing we may never see the frame constructed in our lifetime. Perhaps some of the puzzle I work on will never be completed. But I need to play my pieces anyway." (p. 45) Confidently, play the pieces you were given. Consider what speaks to you and do that. When we're excited about our compassionate work, great things can happen. "Indeed, serving and savoring are often wed." (p. 46) At the same time, we need to be flexible so we can change as needs or priorities change. "In recent times, . . . we've been melding spirituality with activism (what the Buddhists call 'engage spirituality') and our servanthood has grown more holistic and realistic." (p. 46)

We need to give our service with joy—this means practicing such habits as parties at the Fellowship, meditation or yoga or other endeavors to refill our bucket as we dole it out to others. We stay more flexible when we are joyful. Being positive and upbeat gives us resilience and perspective when we're doing important Fellowship work. As UU's, we need to do more than Duty! Duty! Work! We need to balance it with Joy! Joy! Delight! Delight! And hope we strive as UU's "To be hopeful, lifelong carriers of JUSTICE and JOY." (p. 50)

### 8<sup>th</sup> Principle and Article II

My understanding from the MUUSJA (MN UU Social Justice Alliance) annual meeting presentation by Paula Cole Jones on Dec. 6 is that: (1) the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle is more of a grassroots (bottom up) process and the Article II process is more of a top-down proposal from an appointed commission; (2) the Article II proposal, which eliminates Principles, incorporates the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle in spirit and content, if not in specific wording. Cole Jones recommends that the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle approval process move forward in parallel to the Article II process.

Since SCUUF has approved the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle, we should turn our attention to the Article II proposal, which was included in full in the December Newsletter. # **Sad News from the Caring Committee**

We just learned that **Chuck Head** died December 17 in Auckland, New Zealand, at the age of 82. Chuck and Lois had decided not to cancel their trip to New Zealand and Australia even though Chuck had fallen and broken his neck on October 20, and then had a pacemaker implanted and the neck mended. After a couple of days of sightseeing, Chuck fell ill and died in his sleep. He was a 40-year member of the Fellowship and served as our Buildings and Grounds Chairperson years ago. Plans will be announced at a later date for a Service of Commitment for the interment of Chuck's ashes at the Minnesota State Veterans Cemetery in Little Falls and a Memorial Service in St. Cloud in the spring. **Eileen Larsen**'s son, Darren, notified Doug Polley that she died on October 27. She had moved from St. Cloud to live with Darren near Little Falls after being diagnosed with lung cancer. Eileen began attending the Fellowship about 10 years ago and she started our first Covenant Group. She also served as Program Chair for one year and attended Sunday Services regularly until the pandemic. Darren said "The nurses did an absolutely amazing job helping me keep her comfortable ... As you know traditional church wasn't her 'thing' so there will be no wake or funeral. No announcement in the paper. We will have a private, family celebration of her life at some point in the future. I will also place a head stone next to my Dad up at St Thomas of the Pines by Maddens resort ... As for a memorial, please do what you think she would have liked."
