Turn right onto Broadway and proceed into Rockville. At the Rockville Gas and Bait station turn right (north) onto Co. Rd. 139. Once over the Sauk River STAY LEFT onto Sauk River Rd. Go past Rockville County Park to 12299 Sauk River Rd. approximately 1 mile west of the bridge.

An example of this right now is how our Social Justice Committee and congregation have the opportunity to work more actively with The Promise Neighborhood. You are invited by the Social Justice Committee to attend Race Unity Day on June 3, 12:00-4:00. I hope many of you will be able to attend.

The term stewards means "keepers of the hall," folks who labor to keep their chosen religious community spiritually, financially, and programmatically afloat — even lively and growing. Stewardship means drawing upon our highest intentions and most generous aspirations." (p.74)

The workhorses of congregational life are the stewards. When asked to list ideals for UU character development, these are many of the responses—love, justice, acceptance, serenity, courage, joy, forgiveness and humility. But to sustain the path towards the Beloved Community, we need generosity and openheartedness.

"Generous congregations are generative ones. ... They experience gratification of seeing wrongs battled, prejudices undercut, griefs lightened, communities upheld. They recognize that, in the end, we possess nothing except what we've shared or given away." (p. 79)

I find hope for the future that as UUs we have open minds, loving hearts, and welcoming hands. I cherish our stewards and look forward to working together because we need one another.

The book club will meet Saturday, June 3 at 10:00 at the Fellowship and will discuss a hopeful eco-catastrophe book: *The Ministry for the Future* is a novel by American science fiction writer Kim Stanley Robinson. With its emphasis on scientific accuracy and non-fiction descriptions of history and social science, the novel is classified as hard science fiction. It is also a part of the growing body of climate fiction. This book is both highly informative and entertaining. Since the book is long, about 500 pages, start reading soon.

Goodreads describes the book as follows: Told entirely through fictional eye-witness accounts, *The Ministry For The Future* is a masterpiece of the imagination, the story of how climate change will affect us all over the decades to come. Its setting is not a desolate, post-apocalyptic world, but a future that is almost upon us - and in which we might just overcome the extraordinary challenges we face. It is a novel both immediate and impactful, desperate and hopeful in equal measure, and it is one of the most powerful and original books on climate change ever written.

Did you know that SCUUF has been designated a Climate Change Congregation by Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light? What, you may ask, is Interfaith Power and Light? It is not the Power company that supplies your energy. It is a National and State network of diverse faith communities coming together in response to climate change. https://www.mnipl.org/ Google it!

Our responsibility as members is to have two postcard writing events a year in support of climate legislation issues. Currently we are working on a postcard writing session on May 21 regarding the Farm Bill. The Farm Bill is a multi-billion dollar bill that is passed every 5 years and expires this September. The current bill has been heavily influenced by Agribusiness and powerful food corporations with negative effects on small farmers, country of origin information on packaging, environmental pollution, and more.
