Sunday, July 16 at 11:00 a.m. "Nature, Emerson, and cookies" at Bend in the River Regional Park

Hosted by Brenda Graves and Charlotte Stephens.

Enjoy a sauntering transcendentalist walk along the Mississippi, or remain in the oak grove for a discussion of provided quotes about nature by transcendentalist Ralph Waldo Emerson. Ice tea, water, and cookies will be served. This is not a potluck, but you may wish to bring a sack lunch. If you have a lawn chair that you can easily bring, that would be helpful.

Molly Pintok will host a separate time for families and children where families will read a children's book about Emerson's life and legacy. Then the group can go on a nature walk to incorporate and discuss themes they just read about. PB&Js will be provided, but feel free to bring additional snacks and beverages.

"Bend in the River" is the former home of Ann and Stewart Graves, who were part of the original group who started our UU Fellowship; current member, Brenda Graves, was the last resident before the property became a park.

Directions and parking: 1.4 miles south of Rice on River Road (CR 55) and from Highway 10 west on 105th Street and north onto River Road. Park at the farmstead. Location: 11231 River Road NE, Rice, MN 56367.

Sunday, July 30 at 10:30 a.m. Guided nature walk at SJU Arboretum Hosted by the Caring committee.

The Abbey Arboretum is a mix of prairie, oak savanna, oak and hardwood forest, conifer forest, lakes, and wetland. Steve Saupe, a retired botany professor form CSB/SJU, will lead the group on this walk and will talk about the history of the area and anything interesting that we come across along the trail. Please note that the trail is "natural" and not paved. You will cross two wetland areas on floating boardwalks, and although the trail is not difficult to walk on, there are a couple of small hills in the woods. This is a family friendly walk and children are welcome to come along.

Directions and Parking: Head west on I-94, exit at St. John's University, and go toward the university. In approximately 0.7 miles you will see a small parking area on the left and a kiosk where we will meet at 10:30 a.m. If the parking area is full, you can park across the road in the grassy field (which is where people park for fall football games), or along county road 159 near the Arboretum entrance.

After the walk, which may last an hour or two, you are invited to join Steve and Linda at their nearby house to have your lunch, or you can head home. If you want to have lunch at the Saupes, please bring a bag lunch and a beverage. We plan to sit on the back patio, so if you have a lawn chair that you can bring, that would be helpful.

Tuesday, August 1 at 6:30 p.m. Lughnasadh celebration (Celtic Harvest Festival)

This newsletter closes my musings from GROWING A BELOVED COMMUNITY: Twelve Hallmarks of a Healthy Congregation, by Tom Owen-Towle.

The 11th Hallmark is "Keep Journeying." John Lewis sees The Beloved Community at peace with itself, with a sense of coming together to serve the common good. "The journey toward the Beloved Community is a journey of a lifetime." (p. 81) A church that is healthy tries to balance personal growth, spiritual growth, and social justice in an aligned manner. We need each other and "believe that all of us are blessed in this evolving covenant of membership." (p. 83) We need to grow and evolve. "Our Unitarian Universalist congregations constantly nudge their membership to think of themselves not as human beings but as human becomings." (p. 84)

The 12th and final hallmark is "Know That You Are Not Alone." Commit yourself to growing and developing the Beloved Community—right here and now, right where you're planted.

I would like to close with this quote from Olympia Brown (the first woman to be graduated by the theological school and St. Lawrence University; the first woman in our country to achieve ministerial standing recognized by Universalists in 1863):

Dear Friends, stand by this faith. Work for it and sacrifice for it. There is nothing in all the world so important as to be loyal to this faith which has placed before you the loftiest ideals, which has comforted you in sorrow, strengthened you for noble duty, and made the world beautiful for you. . . . One God, one law, one element, and one far-off divine event to which the whole creation moves.

The Unitarian Universalist Association's annual General Assembly began June 21 in Pittsburgh. Louise Goetz and I served as SCUUF delegates, attending the business sessions and voting virtually. We had our hands full with over 80 amendments to vote on for the proposed Article II revision. In the September Newsletter, we will report on the results of both the Article II vote and the election of our new president. Keep in mind that the Article II revision vote this year is to forward the proposal, as amended, to next year's GA, when it will require a two-thirds vote for final approval.
